

What are shoppers looking for?

Adelaide independent online publication, InDaily, has reported that a recent national survey asked shoppers what they wanted above all in their main streets and the answers may surprise you.

A sample of 655 shoppers from around Australia were asked what their shopping preferences were in order of importance.

Pharmacies were the top choice across all gender, age and location demographics. Restaurants/cafés came in second with a supermarket in third spot.

The business mix in MarketQuarter meets these preferences well with four pharmacies in the area: Terry White Chemmart, 61 Grote Street Centre Pharmacy, 15 Gouger Street, Chemist Warehouse, 57A Gouger Street, Superpharmacy 187 Franklin Street (opposite the new IGA supermarket).

We're also spoilt for choice with cafes and restaurants such as Cafe 228, western end of Grote Street and Diverse-City, 163 Gouger Street to the many and varied Asian restaurants and stalls in and around Chinatown Adelaide.

Cleanliness rated as the most important characteristic for a main street, followed by safety, security and parking.

It's a game changer for our Precinct

The former Australia Post site bounded by Grote, Blenheim and Gouger Streets is set to be transformed following State Commission Assessment Panel (SCAP) granting approval for a \$1.25bn multi-tower development.

With permission granted to stage construction over 10 years, the western end of the precinct will be transformed. The property was purchased by Kennards Self Storage three years ago.

Melbourne property development company, Gurner Group, plans five towers ranging from 15 to 28 storeys on the L-shaped parcel of land.

There are to be 600 apartments (including 15% affordable housing), a 16-storey hotel and a wellness centre, as well as office, retail and hospitality spaces.

The development will apparently feature a publicly accessible plaza and laneways throughout the complex.

Architects Elenberg Fraser have been quoted as saying the project will establish an 'unprecedented standard for sustainable living'.

With construction of Victoria Tower and Market Square already underway at the eastern end of Grote Street, this is an exciting period of growth for our precinct.

Pitt Street upgrade is welcome

The City of Adelaide is currently upgrading Pitt Street, which runs between Grote and Franklin Streets. Completion is expected mid-2024.

Her Majesty's Theatre and a carpark dominate the western side of the street, with the Hotel Metropolitan and U-City on the eastern.

The upgrade will improve a key pedestrian connection with wider footpaths improving accessibility, providing space for outdoor dining and with trees along the eastern footpath to beautify and cool the street.

The upgraded road will retain its current two-way traffic flow.

Meanwhile, in the studio ...

As the Pitt Street upgrade gets into full swing its business as usual for the Ruby Award winning U City Art Studio located at 24 Pitt Street Adelaide.

Artist in residence Claire Wildish finds all the activity inspiring as she looks through the studio's expansive windows.

"It's like being in a fishbowl as pedestrians look in to see what we are doing", said Claire. "But we are looking out too, creatively documenting what we are observing."

"We are gathering stories and images that will go into an exhibition to be held when the upgrade is finished. It's an exciting time."

U City Art Studio is a changing exhibition space. Most recently the Emerge community art project celebrated the Feast Festival.

It is open Wednesday to Friday for U City residents and clients to explore their creativity and learn more about knitting, drawing, print making, costume design, mosaics and other artistic pusuits. Friday the studio is open to the public from 10am till Noon.

Exhibition takes us a step back in time

A new exhibition exploring Adelaide's rich history of theatres has opened to celebrate the 110th birthday of the iconic Her Majesty's Theatre.

The exhibition titled *Adelaide Theatres: Then and Now* reflects on more than 180 years of local theatres.

More than 35 theatres are celebrated through old photographs and programs, including those of famed theatre manager and entrepreneur J.C. Williamson.

In a trip down memory lane, the exhibition explores old and new theatres including images from Adelaide's first purpose-built theatre in Gilles Arcade, Queen's Theatre, in 1840.

On display in the Ian and Pamela Wall Gallery, located on the rooftop level of Her Majesty's Theatre, the exhibition is open to the public during performance times.

Of the 35 theatres featured in the exhibition, three still exist: Her Majesty's Theatre (formerly The Tivoli), Adelaide Festival Theatre and Queen's Theatre.

Built in 1913, Her Majesty's Theatre is one of the last remaining examples in Australia of the famous chain of Tivoli theatres. Having played a significant role in Australia's theatre and entertainment history, Her Majesty's Theatre has survived two world wars, the great-depression and two pandemics.




